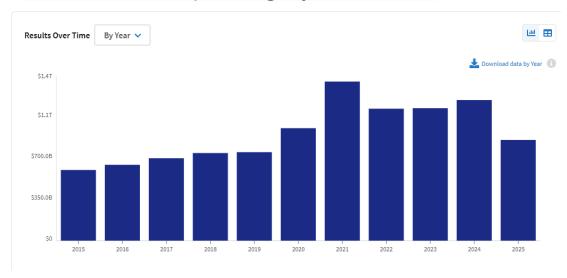

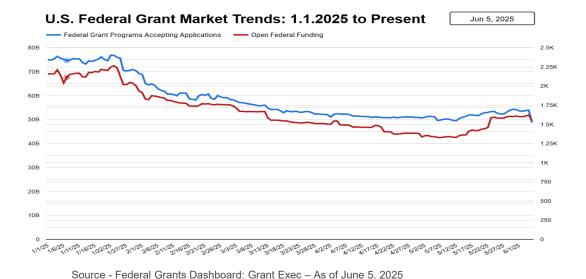
What's Changed in 2025?

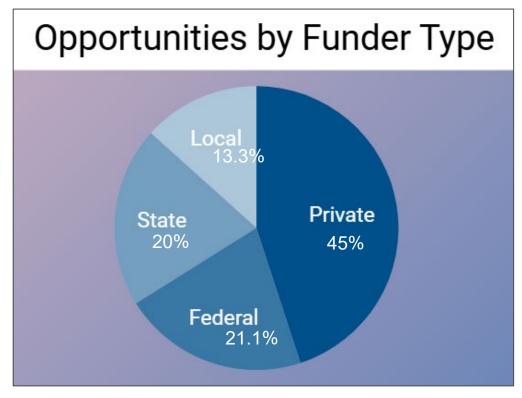

Setting Your Grant Goals for the Year

Assess Current Grant Status

- Evaluate your organization's current grant portfolio and funding gaps
- Analyze the previous year's success rates and identify areas for improvement

Develop SMART Grant Goals

- Structure specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound grant objectives
- Set realistic funding targets based on organizational capacity

Create an Annual Grant Calendar

- Build a simple timeline of grant opportunities
- Plan resource allocation for grant writing and management

Establish Tracking Mechanisms

- Implement systems for monitoring grant deadlines and submissions
- Design metrics for evaluating grant success
- Create reporting templates for stakeholder updates



Components of a Strong Grant Portfolio



Grant Type Diversity

- What percentage of organizational grant funding comes from each grant type (federal, state, local, foundation, corporation)?
- What percentage of organizational grant funding comes from old and new grants?



Funder Alignment

- Does our proposal and mission align with funder's strategic priorities?
- Do we understand the funder's decision-making processes and language?



Lifecycle management

- Are we balancing new opportunities with renewals and long-term grants?
- What is our stewardship process?



Risk Assessment

- Are we over-relying on grants to fund core operations?
- What is our contingency plan if we lose a major grant?
- Do we have reserves or flexible funding to buffer against unexpected changes?

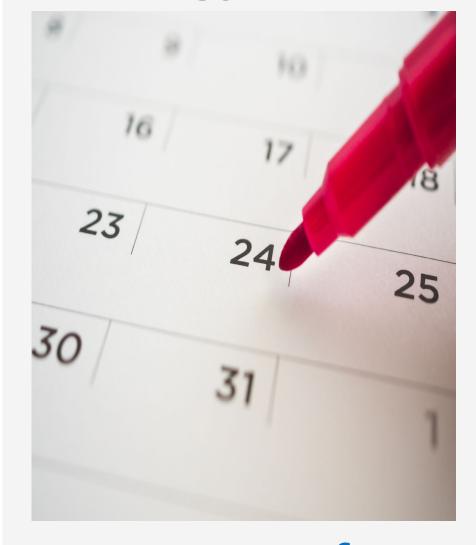

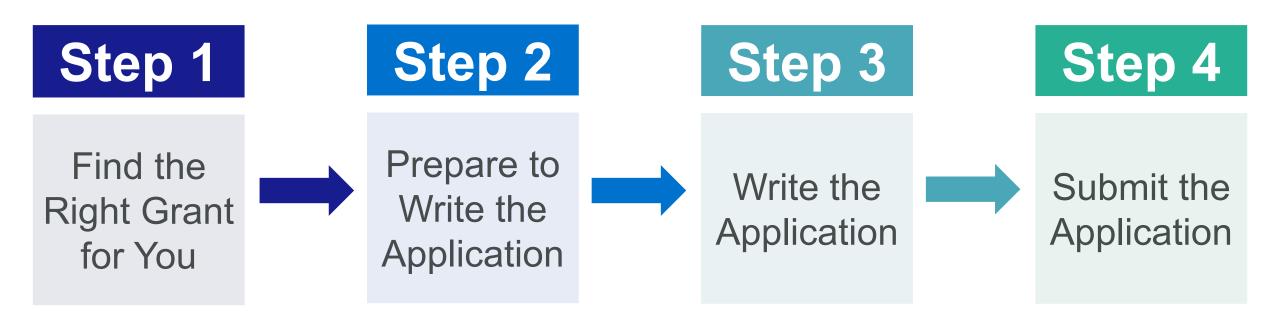

Step 1: Finding the Right Grant for You

Federal Grants

- Grants.gov is an excellent place to find federal grants and other forms of federal financial assistance
- Agency websites are a great place to find federal grants
 - Environmental Protection Agency
 - Health and Human Services
 - United States Department of Agriculture
 - United States Department of Justice

Step 1: Finding the Right Grant for You

State Grants & Local Grants

State Grants

- Search Grants.gov and state agency websites
 - Economic development agencies
 - Educational agencies
 - Housing agencies
 - Health agencies

Local Grants

- Can be offered through local governments, private foundations, and organizations
- Where to look?
 - Local Grants Local government websites
 - Private Grants Individual foundations and organizations



Step 1: Finding the Right Grant for You Selecting the Grant

- Submitting a strong grant application can be a lengthy process
 - It is better to find one grant that aligns well with your project/program and create one very strong application
 - Applying for several grants, if not aligned with your goals, might not be a good use of your time



Case Study

Step 1: Finding the Right Grant for You

A small business is looking for a grant to help fund the addition of solar panels to their facility to increase their energy efficiency. They also anticipate the solar panels will offset the cost of the electricity and reduce their need to draw from the local power grid.

Grant Option 1

Purpose: Provide funding for communities and organizations to invest in green energy infrastructure

Grant Option 2

Purpose: Provide funding to small businesses to update their facilities to be more energy efficient, particularly as it relates to green energy infrastructure

Grant Option 3

Purpose: Provide funding to organizations to update their facilities and operational practices to reduce the output of greenhouse gas emissions



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Purpose: Provide funding to organization to update their facilities and operational practices to reduce the output of greenhouse gas emissions.



Step 2: Preparing to Write the Application

The Notice of Funding Opportunity

- Read the grant notice, often called a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), in detail
- Leverage technology tools to help you summarize the NOFO and pull-out key details and requirements
- Disclaimer: Technology tools should not replace the need for manual review and human judgment

Statement of Need

Project Narrative

Sustainability Plan Budget & Justification

Supporting Materials



Step 3: Writing the Application

The Executive Summary

- A concise, yet compelling, overview of the project, goals, methods, and expected outcomes
- Typically one page or less

Case Study Grant: Rural Energy for America (REAP)

Executive Summary Sections



Example Section

Objectives:

- **1. Energy Independence:** Achieve 100% offset through solar energy generation
- **2. Financial Impact:** Significantly reduce operational costs associated with electricity consumption. Reinvest savings back into the business
- **3. Environmental Impact:** Decrease carbon footprint by reducing reliance on non-renewable energy sources
- **4. Community Support:** Contribute to the local energy grid by selling excess energy, enhancing energy stability and availability



Step 3: Writing the Application

Organizational Information

- Demonstrates capacity to successfully manage the project
- Typically 1–2 pages

Example Section

Applicant Description: ABC Manufacturing is a small family-owned business located in Anywhere, a small town in Missouri. We have been in operation for over 25 years and have a mission to produce metal products crafted with care, quality, and excellence. Our business 100% family owned and operated by the by the Doe family. The company employs 25 dedicated staff members who contribute to our success and growth. We maintain full ownership and control of the business, facility, and land on which the facility is located.



Step 3: Writing the

Application

Statement of Need

- Define the need/problem
- Detail how program/project meets such need

This is an opportunity to connect your identified need to awarding agencies strategic funding objectives.

REAP Funding Priorities	Alignment With Case Study
Promote Renewable Energy	Adding a renewable energy source: Solar
Enhance Energy Efficiency	Reduce reliance on non-renewable energy
Economic Development	Financial savings put back into business = growth and potentially creating new jobs
Environmental Sustainability	Reduce reliance on non-renewable energy = Decrease carbon footprint
Energy Independence	100% energy generation by solar = energy independence
Community Resilience	Selling excess energy to the grid = enhancing energy stability and availability within the community

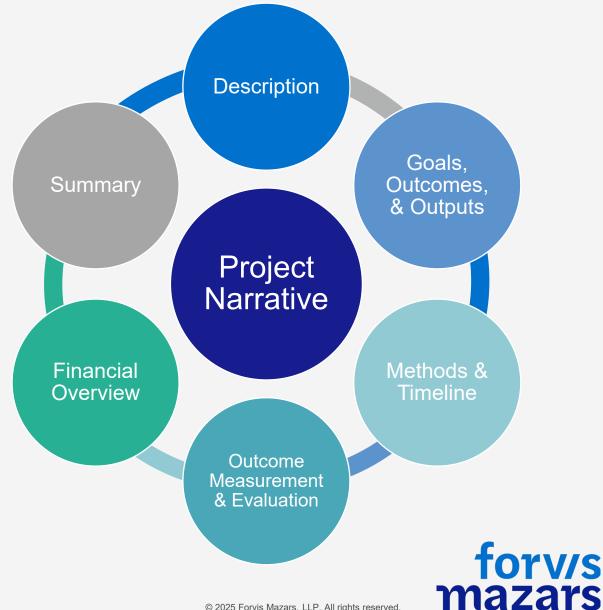


Step 3: Writing the

Project Narrative

- Details of the project, how it will be carried out, and what the anticipated outcomes are
- The longest portion of the application

- Budget Cost Breakdown
- Budget Justification –Cost Explanation

Step 3: Writing the Application

Sustainability Plan

- Explains:
 - Long-term impacts of the award
 - How the project will continue post award
- Can be included in other sections depending on the NOFO

Case Study

Grant: Rural Energy for America (REAP)

Elements of the Application/Grant that Address Sustainability:

Prior Application Sections

 Pro Forma Financial Statements & Outcomes and Evaluation Methods

Technical Report

- Demonstrates commitment to long-term sustainability and reliability of the system
- Includes details on how system will be operated and maintained over its useful life

Feasibility Study – Optional/Recommended

- Helps Agency assess likeliness of the project to succeed after the grant
- Summarizes the long-term viability of the project

Annual Performance Reporting

- Creates accountability to make sure the project delivers as expected, and benefits are tracked real time
- Three years of reporting required



Step 3: Writing the Application

Supporting Materials

- Documents that can reinforce both your organizations and applications, credibility, capacity, and community support
- Examples:
 - Letters of Support
 - Resumes or Bios of Key Personnel
 - Organizational Chart
 - Financial Statements or Audit Reports
 - Entity Setup Documents: 501(c)3 letter, SAM.gov registration, etc.



Step 3: Writing the Application

Review

- A final quality review prior to submission
- Review encompasses:
 - Checking for answers to required questions
 - Checking for general readability and grammar
 - Reviewing NOFO evaluation criteria for preliminary anticipated scoring

Best practice is to have someone that is not deeply involved in the writing process provide the review.



Step 4: Application Submission

- Submit applications early
- Only submit the application when:
 - Required questions/prompts have been answered
 - Required exhibits/attachments have been gathered an uploaded
 - Any reviews have been completed

It is better to take the time to double and triple check your application than it is to submit an incomplete or poor application. Plan Accordingly!

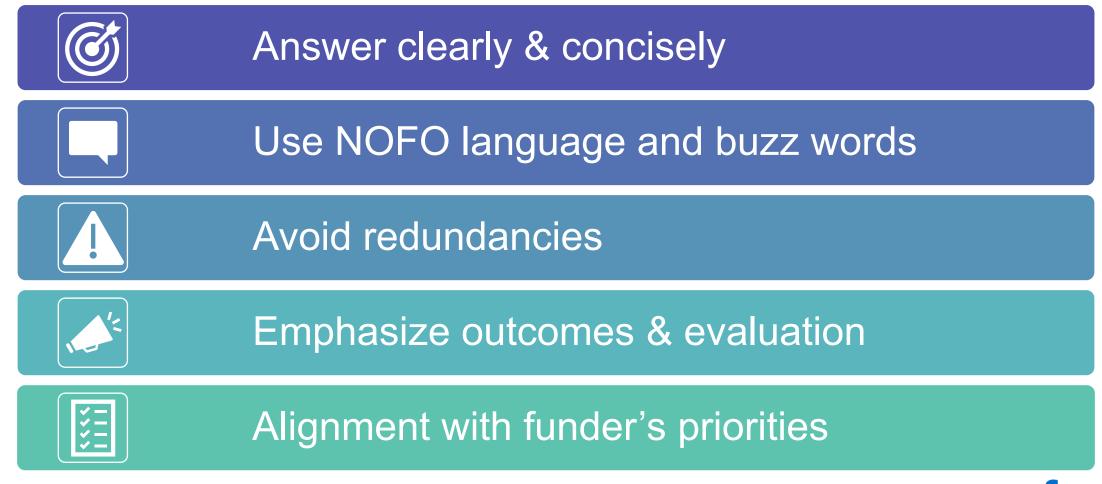

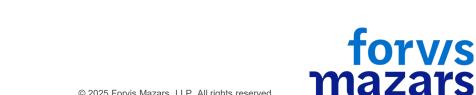
